We remember in worship Christ's transfiguration this Sunday, Feb. 19. The change before their very eyes, a Holy Light shining from Christ's very being, is terrifying for the disciples invited to accompany him to the mountaintop—and perhaps to us, who are with them through the reading. We are engulfed in the sudden cloud that overtakes us as we listen for a voice that speaks of God's Beloved Son and the command, "Listen to him!"

The themes of watching and listening for God and opening our hearts to Wonder recur throughout the Holy Season of Lent, which begins Feb. 22 with Ash Wednesday worship at 8 p.m. We will journey

together, once again, with Christ and one another to the cross, and, ultimately, the mysterious empty tomb and joyful resurrection appearances.

On Ash Wednesday, the ashes humbly remind us of our earthly substance, being created from the dust, knowing that to dust we shall return. The ashes also reassure us that in life and in death, we belong to God. The imposition of ashes in the shape of a cross on our foreheads helps us remember the cost of our redemption in Jesus Christ, who suffered and gave his life for our sakes.

Our Ash Wednesday worship, like Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, will not be livestreamed. We don't have enough volunteers. How may I persuade more people to come for a quick training with Bill Russell and perhaps fill in once a month or occasionally to help us share the hope of Jesus Christ and God's love beyond our church walls? You don't have to be a pro with technology. You just need to be open to learning something new to serve God and your church family with all your gifts and talents.

On the evening that follows Ash Wednesday, I will lead our first gathering of the Lenten Study: Signs and Wonders: A Beginner's Guide to the Miracles of Jesus. We will meet in the Narthex at 7 p.m. You may come for one week, more than one or all 5. We will not meet for the study during the first week in March. Even if you are not a "reader," you will be inspired by the intriguing discussion with Dr. Amy-Jill Levine. The theme of the first lesson is Caregivers—and the important healing role they play. I look forward to hearing your voice in the conversation.

I pray that the Lenten study and worship throughout these 40 Days will lead us to the God of Wonder, more and more.

O Wondrous Sight, O Vision Fair


O wondrous sight! O vision fair of glory that the Church may share, which Christ upon the mountain shows, where brighter than the sun he glows!




Evening Prayer



Syria-Turkey Earthquake

Tidbits from the Food Pantry January/February 2023

PRAYER FOR FOOD PANTRY VOLUNTEERS

This week we would like to start by thanking all the volunteers from First Presbyterian Church of Smithtown who helped to staff the Smithtown Emergency Food Pantry for the month of December, 2022. We were there during an unprecedented surge in demand that saw us providing food for 748 individuals (528 Adults, 170 children ages 5-18, and 50 infants - 4 years). for a total 15,708 meals provided. This meant an average of 15 clients were served during each of the twelve days we were open. (Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 10am to 12 noon). We were closed on Saturday, Christmas Eve.

In addition to the regular food provided, the Pantry also distributed 171 holiday meal boxes; and 130 \$20 grocery gift cards were given out. We also shared holiday meal boxes with Mastic Episcopal (30 boxes) and 25 bags containing Holiday Meals were given to Restoration and Revival of Patchogue for a total of 226 Holiday Meals. Between Thanksgiving and Christmas, a total of 494 Holiday meals were distributed.

The Pantry also served as a collection and distribution site for the St. James Fire Department's Annual Toy Drive. Toys were handed out to 111 children in 51 families during December during regular Pantry hours.

Although need increased substantially, the Pantry was blessed with an increase of donations of both food (from individuals and organized food drives by various schools, businesses, and service organizations) and monetary donations, and we continue to receive support from local supermarkets, which donate bread and discounts on frozen chopped meat and chicken parts. With the money we receive, we are able to purchase milk and eggs, meat and chicken, and personal items, and to fill in on non-perishable food items (canned fruits, vegetables, cereals, pasta and sauces) as needed.

As the need continues, for the time being, we are asking that donations be limited to paper goods, (paper towels, toilet paper) personal care items (shampoos and conditioners, bath soap, toothpaste, feminine care products, diapers {both infant and adult} and wipes), and household items (laundry detergent, and dish washing liquid) pet food, and of course, monetary donations are always welcome. This will allow us to utilize our cash resources to purchase perishables (meats, milk and eggs) and to buy canned and packaged items in bulk at reduced prices.

NEXT UP

We are excited to report that work on the planned renovations in the Pantry is scheduled to begin the middle of February. These renovations will enable us to work and serve our clients in an environment that is safer, more convenient and more comfortable for volunteers and clients alike. As renovation work takes place at the Pantry there may be volunteer opportunities for assisting with painting the spaces and reorganizing and restocking shelves and storage areas.

***MAY is our next month to staff the Pantry. ***

A sign-up sheet will be available in the corridor outside the Narthex in the near future. Please check your calendars and plan to join us. Whether you can serve for one day or several, we welcome you and look forward to having you share in this important outreach and mission of the church in our community. Thank you to everyone for your continued commitment and support of the Smithtown Emergency Food Pantry.




